### ABOUT THE SPEAKER

Judith Walters became interested in genealogy as a child and has actively pursued her ancestry since 1967. Her talk will include how to copy old photos, how to date a photo using clues such as type of clothing the subject is wearing, and the type of photo-finishing used. Judith has a business in her Bothell home specializing in old photographs, where she can make copy negatives and reprints of your old photos. Her extensive collection of old photos and negatives are indexed in a catalog along with documents, letters, and books she has compiled.

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

With the death of Alex Hailey this past month, here in Seattle, I have reflected back upon my own heritage. Most of my lines go back to early American beginnings, 1600 and 1700's, with families like the Barbees, Breeds, Pengras (Pingrey), Lyons, Masons, Washburns, Prestons, and Shermans coming from England; the Millers, Shultz's and Fenrougs of Germany; and the Mullens, Sloans, Boyds and Gillespies from Ireland and Scotland. Most of the information I have been able to get was collected by other people, and as I have discovered these other people through writing known relatives, I have uncovered large collections of family history. Elias Barbee, my 4th great grandfather, fought in the revolutionary war and was at the Battle of Yorktown with his father and three other brothers, all in different companies. He later moved from Virginia to Green County, Kentucky, where he had 13 children, one of whom was Lucy, who was deaf. He was a Brigadier-General in the Kentucky Militia, served in the Kentucky House of Representatives and Senate, and while there, started (in 1823) the Kentucky School for the deaf in Danville, Kentucky, which still exists today. All of this history was obtained from Herbert Barbee, a first cousin twice removed, who lives in Rocky Ford, Colorado. I would encourage all to first write letters and collect as much genealogy as you can from family, and then get into doing the research. Good luck!

## UPGRADE FOR YOUR PAF PROGRAM AVAILABLE LOCALLY

The PERSONAL ANCESTRAL FILE Release 2.2 has been updated effective 5 August 1991. The new release adds a number of capabilities to the program. Some of the new features are:

- o Switch between two databases without exiting PAF or changing the configuration;
- o Add individuals and marriages from the Pedigree Search screen;
- o Improved Ahnentafel Chart -- Marriage date and place added;
- o Date of Death added to Descendancy Charts;
- o Support for additional printers including the HP LaserJet II/III and PaintJet;
- o Mouse support in the GIE (GEDCOM) program;
- o Automatic fix by the Record Check Program for some data problems;
- o Convert the 2--character Temple Codes to the new 5-Character Codes.

This is only a sample. There are 48 listed improvements to the PAF 2.2 Release. The update is a three-disk replacement for the original program, however the upgrade can be installed without any effect on your existing records.

The Salt Lake City Main Office has designated the Computer Interest Group of the Eastside Genealogy Society as the Seattle area distributor of the upgrade disks. The disks will be available at the meetings of the Computer Interest Group. Call Curt Roselle at 885-5945, or Charles Dorian at 391-3536, for information. You must have your PAF license registration card with the registration number, or alternatively, the original copy of your disks to show proof of your PAF ownership. The disks are only \$1 each, \$3 for the works! (Apologies Curt, to all concerned, for not getting this item into the Bulletin last month. Ed.)

Audrey began her genealogy hobby simultaneously with her computer hobby and entered her research data into the Roots II (now Roots III) genealogy data base. The Skeer Family History book would still be on bits and pieces of paper in miscellaneous file drawers or notebooks, had it not been for the computer data entries. Her comb-bound book is nearly 200 pages, contains over fifty pictures, 14-page index, footnotes, and includes biographies or autobiographies written by miscellaneous cousins and Audrey, herself. Her Skeers family settled in Snohomish County in 1906. There will be mini-books forthcoming on other lines, including her French-Canadian Allen line, in the near future. She has shown her book to the Snoqualmie Valley Interest Group and the Roots User Group of Washington State. Audrey encourages other computer users to bite the bullet and crank out their books. Also from Joyce: **Pennsylvania Genealogical Catalogue.** A new computerized collection of 18th and 19th century vital statistics from period newspapers is being produced by Accessible Archives, Inc. Over 300,000 names are now searchable with 6,000 new names added per week. A complete text of all marriages, death notices, and obituaries are currently being extracted from The Pennsylvania Gazette (1728-1750) and the Village Record (1830-1860) involving Berks, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Lancaster, Montgomery and Philadelphia Counties in PA, Cecil County, MD, and New Castle County, Delaware. ## National Genealogical Society Quarterly

### MAJOR CREDENTIALS USED WITHIN AMERICAN GENEALOGY

*Note:* Aside from the Board of Certification of Genealogists, which was established as a nonprofit agency in 1964, there are several other agencies, societies, and organizations that accord widely respected credentials or honorific initials to American genealogists. The following cross-agency list of those nationally and internationally recognized also represents the credentials commonly used for contributors within the present journal.

- \* A.G. *Accredited Genealogist.* One who has passed the rigorous tests administered by the Family History Library (FHL) of Salt Lake City.
- C.A.I.L.S. *Certified American Indian Lineage Specialist.* One who has passed the rigorous tests administered in this specialty by BCG since 1976.
- C.A.L.S. *Certified American Lineage Specialist.* One who has passed the rigorous tests administered in this specialty by BCG since 1969.
- \* C.G. *Certified Genealogist.* One who has passed the rigorous tests administered in this specialty by BCG since 1964.
- C.G.I. *Certified Genealogical Instructor.* One who has passed the rigorous tests administered in this specialty by BCG since 1987.
- C.G.L. *Certified Genealogical Lecturer.* One who has passed the rigorous tests administered in this specialty by BCG since 1983.
- C.G.R.S. *Certified Genealogical Record Searcher.* One who has passed the rigorous tests administered in this specialty by BCG since 1964.
- DIP. F.H.S. *Diploma—Family History Studies.* Awarded by the Society of Australian Genealogists to those who take its course of study and subsequently pass its rigorous exams.
- \* F.A.S.G. *Fellow of the American Society of Genealogists.* Fellowship in ASG, an honor society established in 1940, is limited to fifty living inductees elected on the basis of their genealogical scholarship—as evidenced by the quality and extent of their publications. An F.A.S.G. is tapped without prior knowledge of his or her consideration as a candidate for the honor.
- F.I.G.R.S. *Fellow of the Irish Genealogical Research Society (Ireland).* An honor accorded in recognition of outstanding service to the society and/or contributions to Irish genealogy.
- F.N.G.S. *Fellow of the National Genealogical Society.* An honor accorded in recognition of outstanding service to the society and/or worthy contributions to American genealogy.
- F.S.G. *Fellow of the Society of Genealogists (London).* An honor accorded in recognition of outstanding service to the society and/or worthy contributions to British genealogy.
- F.U.G.A. *Fellow of the Utah Genealogical Association (International).* An honor accorded in recognition of outstanding service to the society and/or worthy contributions to genealogy at large.

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\*The genealogical consumer should be aware that these initials are periodically offered for sale by groups (or otherwise appropriated by individuals) who have no association with BCG, ASG, or FHL; thus, they are used—naively or otherwise—by some who have not passed the BCG and FHL tests or met the even more demanding qualifications of ASG. Genealogists who rightfully use the BCG-designated initials can be identified by their use of the BCG seal. Fellows of ASG and researchers accredited by FHL have no corresponding seal in use.
