EGS HISTORY RECAP

Summer 1977. Polly Vann, an Eastside resident, had completed a genealogy class taught by Rosemary Boyle from the Seattle Genealogical Society. This inspired her to see if other eastsiders were interested in finding their roots. Polly posted a sign-up sheet at the Bellevue Public Library asking for interested persons to sign up. Over 100 persons responded and 80-90 attended the first meeting in September or October, 1977.

In April 1978, the first organizational meeting was held at the Bellevue Public Library, with 24 members in attendance. The group was named the Eastside branch of the Seattle Genealogical Society (ESGS). Also in 1978, EGS sponsored a beginners' help table every six weeks at the Lake Hills Library, Bellevue. Many new members were recruited through these help sessions and Frankie Larson's beginning genealogy classes at Bellevue Community College.

In the fall of 1980, EGS branch dues were established; \$3.00 for seniors and students, \$5.00 singles, and \$6:00 duals. Members were also required to join SGS at \$10:00 per annum, as well as pay the EGS dues.

May 30, 1981, the first EGS Genealogical Fair was held at Crossroads Mall, Bellevue. The theme was "Your Family in History."

October 6, 1981, Lake Hills Library signed an agreement with EGS to house the genealogical collection behind the librarian's desk. EGS was to maintain and reshelve the books.

October 8, 1981, a letter from Terry McCormick, EGS president, to the membership recommended that EGS formally organize as an independent non-profit organization. A ballot was enclosed for members with dues in good standing to vote on this issue. The reasons behind the incorporation were that the eastside was a fast growing area and it was felt that a genealogical society located on the Eastside, with its own library holdings, would best serve the population on this side of the lake.

April 1982, EGS became a separate entity by majority vote. Articles of Incorporation were drawn up and filed in Olympia, WA, on April 20, 1982. Purpose of the Society was to be devoted to the education and study of genealogy.

May 6, 1982, first EGS board meeting was held. Harriet Scott and Mary Magnuson - Co-Presidents; Vice President - Betty Pfeiffer; Secretary - Frankie Larson; Treasurer - Billie Holnagel; Membership - Florine Alexander; Parliamentarian - Larry Counter; Publicity - Betty Pfeiffer; Librarian - Helen Joiner; Program - Donna Counter; By-Laws Committee - Bill Van Kleeck, Bob Ennis, Jackie Smelser, Mary Lou McKibben, Terry McCormick, Larry Counter, Supplies - Betty Wade; Surname and Records - Frank and Rose Yound. Other members included Bill Joiner, Marcella Patterson, and Richard Gates. Approximately 22 members total.

May 22, 1982, EGS held the 4th Annual Genealogical Fair at Crossroads Mall, Bellevue. The theme was "Family History at the 'Crossroads'." The fair featured entertainment, authors autographing their books, selling the EGS cookbook and a Depression Garden Starter. Exhibits included Hereditary and Patriotic Societies, Heraldry Publications, educational displays, museum heritage, pioneer and community history, scouts, genealogical research tools and aids, family associations, historical societies, and, of course, coffee and cookies! King County Executive Randy Revelle cut the ribbon at the opening ceremony. A Certificate of Appreciation was awarded to Rody Burrows, Bellevue pioneer, for his outstanding exhibits at the EGS 1981 and 1982 fairs.

December 9, 1982, EGS By-Laws were approved by majority membership vote. Article III. MEMBERSHIP, Section 1, states - CHARTER MEMBERS of this Corporation shall be the subscribers of the agreement to organize and incorporate this Society, and are members in good standing at the time of adoption of these by-laws.

August 12, 1982, EGS family picnic - potluck at Robinswood Park, Bellevue.

April 23, 1983, EGS sponsored "Irish Genealogical Workshop" featuring Donna Hotaling, held at the Greenwood Inn, Bellevue. 89 persons attended.

May 12, 1983, General membership approved using profiles from Irish workshop, EGS board decision to purchase 22 rolls of microfilm of the Griffiths Valuation (Irish Tax Records) to be housed on indefinite loan basis at the North Stake LDS Family History Library in Seattle. This location was selected as it had several good, workable readers and the microfilm would be secure in a locked cabinet. 48 new members joined during the past year.

August 4, 1983, EGS presented the Lake Hills Library with a one-year subscription to the Genealogical Helper in appreciation of their storing our library collection. Note: This subscription has become a yearly gift from EGS.

January 18, 1984, EGS had 100 members. Help and instruction for beginners were the major goals for EGS.

February 15, 1984, Beginner kits were given to new members, including samples of charts and "How to Booklet."

March 1984, An all-member mini fair was held.

May 5, 1984, EGS Canadian seminar "Sources and Methods for Researching in Canada," speakers Dr. Thomas Warren and wife, Gretha Maria Warren. The seminar was held at the First Congregational Church in Bellevue.

May 1984, EGS donated to the Bellevue Public Library the 1900 census microfilm (T623) rolls #1743-4 from AGLL (American Genealogical Lending Library), Washington State volumes 4,5, 6 part of King County.

December 1984, current EGS logo adopted. The logo was designed by Larry Counter.

March 16, 1985, Certificates of Appreciation were given to Ringdall Junior High students who developed original and informative exhibits as a result of their "Project Reach" assignments. A special showing of their work was held at Lake Hills Library and four exhibitors were chosen to display at the general meeting.

1985, a trip to Salt Lake City.

April 20, 1985, German Seminar by Dr. and Mrs. Warren.

May 16, 1986, Advanced U.S. research, by Dr. and Mrs. Warren.

October 17, 1987, "Roots Fair" at Crossroads Mall, Bellevue.

June 1990, Roots Fair at Crossroads Mall, Bellevue, featuring ethnic entertainment, EGS Supply Table, and Interest Groups; as well as Ethnic Heritage Council; Bellevue Historical Society; LDS Family History Library; Sons of Italy; Dollarhyde Systems; Judith Allison Walters, Old Photographs; and more.....

In 1990, Melissa Clausen directed the Bellevue Vital Statistics project, which was completed after four years of research. (EGS sells lists of Bellevue births, marriages and deaths.)

February 1991, EGS sponsored Beginning Genealogy class for six weeks, held at Issaquah Community Center.

April 1991, EGS held Beginning Genealogy class for four weeks at Lake Hills Library, Bellevue.

July 16, 1991, Seminar with Ron Bremner of Salt Lake City, held at Bellevue Library.

August 1991, New EGS projects begin: 1890 census index and the WA State probate index. X

November 1991, EGS genealogy workshop, held all day at St. Andrews Church, Bellevue, with about 90 people attending.

April 1992, EGS memberships total 319! Includes 13 Interest Groups.

May 14, 1992, Celebration of the 10th Anniversary of EGS incorporation as an independent society. Open House with displays from EGS interest groups, EGS historical scrapbooks, program by Bob Ennis and Florine Alexander on History of EGS, fiddle playing by John Sears, cake, coffee, and punch reception, and a chance to socialize with our membership. Certificates of Honor to be given to Charter Members and Past EGS Presidents. Certificates of Appreciation to Bellevue Library for hosting EGS meetings for 14 years, and to Lake Hills Library for housing our genealogical book collection for 11 years.

Larry Counter, EGS Charter Member, passed away on Saturday, April 25, 1992, at the Pacific Regent Hospice, in Bellevue, WA. Larry was born in Middlebury, Vermont on September 17, 1927. COPYING NATURALIZATION RECORDS
(information courtesy of Janet G. Nixon Baccus, our April speaker)

Please be advised that the Immigration and Nationality Act (U.S. Code 1454e) limiting the certification and reproduction of naturalization records was amended in 1963. This amendment allows uncertified copies of naturalization records to be issued. The government printed a form (M-154) which summarized the main points of the naturalization laws.

The Form apprises clerks of court of the restrictions applicable to the issuance of copies and information from naturalization records. As stated in the Form, unless the court has issued an order in an individual case directing the making and issuance of certification of any part of the naturalization records, clerks of court are prohibited by law from making and issuing such certifications. However, the law authorizes this Service to make and issue such certifications upon application made to this Service. Persons requiring such certifications should follow the instructions outlined in Form M-154.

The revision of the Form has been occasioned by a change in policy respecting the making and issuance of uncertified copies and information from naturalization records by clerks of court. Until now, clerks of court have been restricted to furnishing such information orally only. This restriction has been removed, and clerks of court may now furnish uncertified copies or information in writing, by printing, by photocopy or by any other reproductive process, as well as orally, in accordance with the rules of court. Clerks of court do not require the consent or approval of this Service for the making and issuance of such uncertified copies or information.

A facsimile reproduction of Form M-154 is shown below.

Clerks of court are prohibited by law from making and issuing certifications of a naturalization record or any part thereof, except upon order of the Court. The Immigration and Naturalization Service is authorized by law to make such certifications when needed in any judicial proceeding, or to comply with a State or Federal Statute. Persons requiring such certifications should be advised to submit application Form N-585 to the appropriate Service office. A supply of Form N-585 is available to clerks of court or to other interested persons from the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

The prohibition against the issuance of certifications by clerks of court does not extend to the furnishing of uncertified information. Clerks of court may furnish such information orally, in writing, by printing, or by photocopy or other reproductive process, in accordance with the rules of the court, without consent of or approval by the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

For Your Information

- o **Ohio militia records** dating from 1803-1860 are now easily accessible to researchers. These documents, which were once maintained by the Ohio Adjutant General, are now part of the State Archives housed at the Ohio Historical Center. Included are correspondence, proceedings of court martials, reports and rosters. The series date primarily from 1812 to 1815, 1835, and 1846 to 1848 -- the years of the War of 1812, the Ohio-Michigan boundary dispute, and the Mexican War. The militia archives provide detailed descriptions of Ohioans for whom there is no other surviving record. -- Ohio Historical Society, 1827 Velma Avenue, Columbia, Ohio 43211 (So King Newsletter, March 1992)
- o **The Swedish Finn Historical Society**, 7400 Woodlawn Avenue NE, Seattle, WA 98115, sends information on their society, which is affiliated with the Vasa Finland Genealogy Society. Emigration from the Swedish section of Finland, primarily Ostrobothnia, to North America began in earnest around 1870. The majority of these "Finlandssvenskar" settled in the northern areas of the United States. Seattle was one of the primary settlement areas for the Swedish-Finn immigrants. In February, 1991, an archives was established for the collection of histories, photos, memorabilia and printed matter. This new historical society was formed to maintain the archives and interested citizens are invited to become involved. **Interim President is Sue Alskog (483-2991)**. EGS library has a blank membership questionnaire for those interested in supporting the society.
- o When submitting forms to the **Federal Archives for Military Records**, you should **include the wording, "send complete Medical File."** Medical records are not filed with the military records. If the veteran was injured, hospitalized, or received medical discharge, there could be helpful information in the medical file, but you must request it. (reprinted from the Davis County Newsletter, via The Apple Orchard, Chelan Valley Genealogical Society, Vol. 2, No. 2, April-May, 1992)
- o **Substitute for 1890 Chicago Census.** For any persons who are looking for a replacement for the 1890 Census from Chicago, there is good news. Poll lists of voters for the City of Chicago for 1888, 1890, and 1892 have been microfilmed and are available at the Illinois Archives.
