FOR YOUR INFORMATION

- * **There is a series of videos at the Bellevue Regional Library which present "a panorama of contemporary Europe, with each program capturing the distinctive atmosphere of the country it examines."** Geography, history, culture, industry and government organizations are explored. To access these films, look at the Main Menu on the computer, and choose **#5, Series**. To name this series, type out **Modern Europe Series**. There are 17 countries listed with a video for each. The call numbers are in the 940s.

- * **ANCESTRY Magazine** has published a book compiled by Virginia Humling of Bothell about Catholic church records. Call 1-800-ANCESTRY for information about U.S. Catholic Sources: A Diocesan Research Guide.
- * **Are you planning a research trip to the Allen County Public Library, Fort Wayne, Indiana?** Call 800-767-7752 to request copies of the **Discover Your Roots** brochure and the Genealogical Library pamphlet. The Convention and Visitors Bureau of Fort Wayne has put together a Discover Your Roots Package with a special hotel rate and other benefits for researchers at the Library, which has the second largest public genealogy collection in the country. This offer expires at the end of 1995.
- * **Are you looking for a forebear who might have been in the California Gold Rush?** Maybe you can trace him through the work done by an Auburn, CA, couple -- Jim and Melinda Landrith, who started recording the remote cemeteries along the Golden Chain, now Highway 49, where the gold rush settlements were located. Since 1977, they have recorded more than 400 cemeteries in Northern California, and have published 40 books about their project. The books, which are also on fiche, are available through FHL in SLC and from the authors.

The Landriths find old towns by looking in *California Gold Camps*, by Erwin Gudde, which lists all of the gold camps from the time California became a state. They use old maps with survey lines, which are the same now as they were then, comparing the old maps with the new one. A companion book, *California Place Names*, also by Gudde, lists the rest of the communities in California that did not have mines, such as farming and railroad communities. - * **Original Ohio birth certificates of adopted persons born before January 1964** can be inspected and copied by adopting parents, an adopted person, or any lineal descendant. You must submit a notarized signature, two copies of identification (driver's license and social security number) and proper forms available from Vital Statistics, Ohio Department of Health, P.O. Box 15098, Columbus, OH 43216-0098. (from NGS, July/August 1995, via Eastern WA G.S. 1993)
- * **Lawton, Oklahoma, Public Library has a unique Kiowa, Comanche, and Apache Research Collection** containing data not available elsewhere, including Indian Census Rolls, land allotment list, and WPA's 1930 Indian Pioneer History Collection. ENCOURAGING A REPLY TO YOUR LETTER

Letters are the research lifeblood of most genealogists. Here are some suggestions to encourage the receiver to answer your correspondence:

- * You do answer letters you receive from others, don't you? Even if the question asked doesn't match your family? If not, why not? Do you think the letter-writer sent you that reply envelope as a gift? If you don't answer letters you receive, why should the other fellow answer letters you send -- and then where would we all be? Answer letters promptly. If the information sought doesn't apply to you, jot a note to that effect on the bottom of the letter and ship it back immediately. (You might like to keep a photocopy of the letter with your note, just in case at a later date you find you do connect.) If it does match your ancestry, share what you know as soon as possible; you may receive more information by return mail. And you do share what additional tidbits you have in return, don't you?
- * Receiving a reply to a letter sent to a foreign country is more likely to happen if International Reply Coupons are enclosed with the original letter. These now cost \$1.05 each at your local post office, and two should be enclosed for an airmail reply to your overseas letter. Mention in your letter that the receiver should take the two coupons you have enclosed to the person's own post office and use them to pay for the airmail postage on the person's reply to you. The person to whom you are writing may not know what an International Reply Coupon is or what to do with it, particularly if he or she doesn't read English. IMMIGRATION RECORDS IN CANADA

There is very little in the way of specific immigration records prior to 1865. For the early years you are limited to the traditional sources such as cemetery, church, and town records. The Colonial Office records are available on microfilm at the Canadian National Archives.

After 1865, the main sources of information are the passenger manifests located at the National Archives of Canada. They are available for specific time periods and location for arrivals as follows: Quebec 1865-1918; Halifax 1880-1919; North Sidney, Nova Scotia 1906-1919; St. John, New Brunswick 1900-1918; Vancouver 1905-1919; Victoria, British Columbia 1905-1919.

The Archives also has lists of immigrants crossing the Canada-US border, as well as lake and sea locations, for the period of 1908-1918. They are listed by the border crossing location and date of arrival, not by name. Therefore you need a place and approximate date to work with, not just a name.

If you are researching immigration records from 1919 to the present, they are under the jurisdiction of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration. There are several restrictions on their use due to privacy laws. You must be granted permission by the person whose records you are seeking, or a relative of a deceased person.

Also available are records of the immigration department which contain central registry files, briefing books, petitions, manuals, instructions, policy papers, and any unusual cases from 1892 to present. Other records of interest to genealogists include: Marriage Bonds, Land Petitions, Military Lists, Census Records, Manuscripts and Diaries.

The National Archives of Canada is located in Ottawa and is open Mon-Fri, 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. If you are planning to visit the Archives, write or call ahead for an appointment. You need to do your homework to determine what sources are available in Canada. These records can not be borrowed and you can not browse the stacks. You must register to gain access to them. If you are writing for information, you are limited to three questions per letter. A fee may be charged for this service.

Other excellent sources of research for Canada are available through the National Library of Canada. (The Newsletter of the Irish Family History Forum, April 1995)

Canadian Notes Miscellaneous. Notice: The Presbyterian Church Archives (Canada) has closed its office to the public for the remainder of this calendar year. It has become necessary to find a new site for the Archives because of environmental and space considerations. Possible locations in Toronto are currently being investigated. It is hoped that doors will be open to patrons early in the new year. In the interim, the Archives staff will provide limited reference assistance over the phone and through the post. For the present, they remain at the same mailing address and phone number - Mrs. Kim Arnold, Archivist/Records Administrator, Presbyterian Church Archives, 59 George Street, Toronto, ON M5S 2E6. VERTICAL FILES

At last! The nucleus of a vertical file of materials of interest to genealogical researchers has been established at Bellevue Regional Library as part of the EGS library project. At present the file is a work in progress, intended to be expanded and maintained on a continuing basis. The last three drawers of the Pamphlet File cabinetry have been assigned to EGS for this use. A staff person at the reference desk (second floor) can direct you to the file.

The terms "pamphlet file" and "vertical file" are used interchangeably to denote small, brief publications that cannot be shelved with books. Pamphlets, brochures, clipped articles, snippets of information and other miscellanea are filed in manila folders by subject heading. Thus far there are folders for each U.S. state and Canadian province, many countries (Italy, England, etc.), some geographic regions (Middle East, Pacific Northwest, etc.), and some immigrant/ethnic groups (Swedish Americans, Russian Germans, etc.). Other headings include such topics as "Oral History", "Photographs--Preservation", and "Heraldry". Information pertaining to land records will be found under "Land Settlement" sub-divided by region or state (e.g., "Land Settlement--New England"), while cemetery lists are filed by state or region with the sub-division Cemeteries (e.g., "Oregon--Cemeteries"). Vertical files are not cataloged into the computer, thus you will want to familiarize yourself with the available topics by scanning the file folder labels. There are currently about 150 labeled folders; additional ones will be added as required. Eventually a printed list of subject headings, with cross references, will be available.

All materials are stamped "GENEALOGY VF" (in green) to distinguish them from similar materials which are part of Bellevue Library's own files. Also, those with the genealogy stamp are for use in the library only as they are one-of-a-kind items. Bring your notebook for making notes on the information you find and coins to photocopy pieces you want for your own use. Then always - always - return the folder and its contents to the file for the next researcher's use.

One last word about the file contents: The space available for these materials will be limited, and we must allow room for expansion. Therefore items or categories of information which are available elsewhere will not be included. This is especially true of local and regional information of purely historical value. If the information is at Bellevue Historical Society, or Marymoor Museum, or the Mormon Family History Library, it will not be in the genealogy file at the library. At this point there are no promotional brochures as the genealogical periodicals, also now available at Bellevue Library, carry advertisements from small and large publishers. However, we will keep the most recent twelve months of issues of the "Bulletin Board" in a folder labeled "EGS Newsletters" just in case yours has been misplaced. Also, it should be noted that the individual family histories which had been in the original EGS collection are now available at the Family History Library in Bellevue. What we will attempt to provide in the genealogy vertical file is information that will help you to understand this fascinating pursuit called "Genealogy" and to further your own research. Happy hunting!!

Remember The Seven C's When You Correspond

Much has been made in the last few years about the decline of the art of correspondence. It is claimed we just don't write the type of letters that were written a hundred years ago. That we've somehow lost the ability to communicate well in our letters.

Sure, that's a generalization. There were people a hundred years ago whose letters were as bad as some of those written today. But there is still a need to communicate effectively by using the written word, whether that word is transmitted by pony express, air mail, or e-mail.

Effective correspondence isn't based on flowery language and exquisite composition. Most people already have the vocabulary to convey their messages. But to do it right, you need to keep in mind what the *Handbook for Genealogical Correspondence* refers to as the "Seven C's". Like the Golden Rule, these are simple rules to follow to ensure that your letters will be read, understood, and responded to.

Clean. Keep your letters neat and legible. If you're sending a message on paper, use a new, standard-size sheet of paper. Non-lined if you're typing. If you're like me, you may want to use lined paper for handwritten letters, to make sure your lines don't wander all over the page. Use a dark ribbon in your typewriter, and dark ink for a handwritten letter. Use nice, wide margins.

For an electronic message, the same rules apply. Don't try to make each line as wide as possible. Keep the length down to less than 80 columns wide at all costs.

Correct. Be as accurate as possible in your spelling, punctuation, and grammar. You may not know every genealogical detail of the family you're writing about, but be as accurate as possible in relating the names, dates, and places you are sure of.

Clear. Don't wander all around your subject. Be clear about your purpose, so that the reader isn't left wondering why you wrote in the first place. If

necessary, write a rough draft of your letter first, and refine it before you send it. This is especially true for any letter composed on a computer or word processor. This technology lets you see and modify your words before they are printed or sent. Use it for that purpose.

Courteous. Always be courteous in your dealings with others, whether you're communicating via the mail, on the telephone, using the Internet, or in person. Sincerely express your gratitude in advance for any help you receive. And especially, *always respond promptly* to every reply you receive.

Considerate. Even though you are spending your time and energy writing the letter, remember you are asking a favor of the other person. At the very least, he or she will spend an equal amount of time and effort just to respond, and possibly a great deal more to locate and compile the information you need. Be considerate of the person you are writing to. Don't demand every single piece of information they have. Rather, ask them politely, and offer to share whatever information you have.

Concise. Keep it short and to the point. If the reader must wade through several pages of your missive to find out what you want, he or she may not make it all the way through, and your letter will wind up in the waste bin. On the other hand, don't be so brief that your reader is left wondering exactly what you are talking about. State your purpose clearly and concisely.

Complete. Don't leave your reader wondering if you know something that you're holding back. Tell what you know about the family, and provide the necessary background. This is especially true when you are responding to someone else's request.

Again, when you're writing a letter, make sure it's clean, correct, clear, courteous, considerate, concise, and complete.

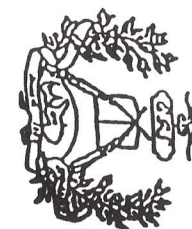
