Getting Started

First: list the generations you know along with what you know about each person: birth date and place, marriage date and place, death date and place siblings and spouses. Include sources.

Next fill in a pedigree chart and family group chart. Don't abbreviate names and include middle names and use all capitals for surnames. List women by their maiden names.

Use this format for dates: day, month, year. And for places: city, county and state.

Now, to fill in the gaps in the pedigree chart. This is where the research comes in.

First, contact family members. Someone may have information you don't have: diaries, photo albums, family bibles, scrapbooks and so forth. And don't assume your surname has always been spelled one way and use family stories as clues unless there is a primary source along with them

Read how-to books and keep an eye out for classes at your local library.

Also, Ancestry Academy and Family Search WIKI have AV presentations online for free.

Consider joining a local genealogical society. Most have monthly meetings with programs, newsletters and give classes.

A couple of free sources are FamilySearch.org and Ancestry.com library edition. Between them they have 30-40 billion online records.

Tax records Military records

Court records Newspapers

Will and probate Land records

Cemetery records Vital records (BMD)
