MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT Connie Balazic

The topic for the September Bulletin Board addresses the issue of every genealogist's responsibility to protect genealogical resources and respect those who are in charge of their safe-keeping. Reason speaks to the future and clearly points out that this combined effort will not be valiant enough to secure five, ten, or twenty years down the line. It is quite apparent that multitudes of descendants are eagerly looking to the past for a solid foundation of moral and ethical roots -- roots and branches that willingly sacrificed to provide for their posterity.

Today's generation must step forward and offer a clearly defined plan for providing each researcher access to all public records. Iowa, for example, is surveying the possibility of one central archive or repository for the state. Is this the solution for every state?

Time taken away from routine but necessary duties and the mounting volume of written requests are turning some of the once-friendly clerks sour toward family history. Volunteers can be the solution to this problem, thus maintaining the records in traditional offices. Volunteers are used successfully in public libraries, state archives, schools, hospitals, etc. County and state vital records offices could also benefit from the services of experienced genealogists who would meet the public and supervise the care and handling of public records, along with answering correspondence.

Each genealogical society throughout the United States could offer a certification program that would train and supervise volunteers for this program within its own locality, providing relief for the regular staff and efficient service to the public.

If the above suggested program seems logical and practical, please send a copy of this message to every society that you belong to. Eastside Genealogical Society can plant the seeds that could grow into a national program. Posterity will reap what you sow!

REFERENCE REPORT

INQUIRY: Passport Records

REPORT: Since 1798, the Department of State has issued passports to U.S. citizens traveling abroad. The Department did not, however, have sole authority to do so until an Act of August 18, 1856 (11 Stat. 60), for the first time regulated the issuance of passports.

There was no statutory requirement that Americans obtain a passport for travel abroad until World War I, although an order by Secretary of State William H. Seward prohibited departure from or entry into the United States without a passport during the period August 19, 1861 - March 17, 1862. Many persons did obtain passports, however, because they were required by the countries to which they were traveling or because the traveler wanted the protection a passport might provide. On November 14, 1914, the State Department issued a requirement that American citizens must have a valid passport for travel abroad. This was followed by Executive Order 2285 of December 15, 1915, which gave presidential authorization to the same requirement. Then the Travel Control Act of May 22, 1918, made the requirement a matter of statutory law. A Joint Congressional Resolution of March 3, 1921, technically ended the war-time restrictions on travel, including the passport requirement. An Act of June 21, 1941, reimposed the statutory requirement, and the "Immigration and Nationality Act" of June 27, 1952, made it unlawful to depart from or enter the United States without a valid passport.

State Department passport records in the custody of National Archives include applications dated October 27, 1795 - November 30, 1812; February 22, 1820 - November 15, 1831; and May 13, 1833 - December 31, 1905; emergency applications submitted abroad, 1877 - 1907; originals and copies of passports, 1794 - 1901; and applications for special (diplomatic) passports, 1829 - 1897. Applications dated 1906 - 1925 are in the Civil Reference Branch in Suitland, MD.

Finding aids for these records are incomplete. There is an alphabetical card index for applications dated 1850 - 1852 and 1860 - 1880. For the years 1810 - 1817 and 1834 - 1905, there are also registers and indexes which vary in arrangement. Some are chronological and some are alphabetical by the first letter(s) of the applicant's surname.

GENEALOGICAL VS. HISTORICAL RESEARCH

A well-constructed analysis by Donn Devine points out the difference between genealogical and historical research. Mr. Devine is a well-known archivist and genealogist whose genealogy column in the August, 1994 issue of **IRISH EDITION (Philadelphia)** contains the following excerpt:

"Those (genealogists) who began as academic historians often find genealogy a more rigorous discipline. Historians may support their thesis by selectively assembling the evidence favorable to it, often opinions or conclusions from secondary sources. Genealogists, however, are judged on being able to find and evaluate all the relevant contemporary documents, and don't consider a fact as certain until other alternatives have been ruled out, or any conflicting evidence is satisfactorily explained. Otherwise, they qualify a conclusion as *possible* or *probable*."

* NATIONAL ARCHIVES -- PACIFIC NORTHWEST REGION

Changes in Public Services Effective November 1, 1994, the National Archives-Pacific Northwest Region will no longer accept individual daytime reservations for the use of microfilm readers. Microfilm readers will be available on a first-come, first-served basis for periods of two hours or more, depending upon the number of people waiting to use the machines. Also effective November 1, 1994, the Regional Archives will be open only the first and second Tuesday evenings of each month, 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. We regret the need to make these changes, but they are necessary to simplify administrative procedures during a period of record workloads and declining staff resources.

* SOVIET SEARCH BREAKTHROUGHS

Ragas, the Russian-American Genealogical Archival Service, is now accepting requests for genealogical searches in repositories. Forms are available for requesting either a single record or a fuller genealogical search. Success in locating a record increases with specificity in terms of date and place of event. [Nonrefundable cost: \$22. Obtain payment schedules for detailed or genealogical searches, as well as a per-hour retainer, and forms, by writing to RAGAS, P.O. * **VIRGINIA STATE LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES**

The Virginia State Library and Archives will assess a research service fee of \$10 for replies to all out-of-state requests for research services, effective August 1, 1993. The research service fee must be paid at the time an inquiry is submitted. The research process includes:

- locating the information or records desired
- examining the material for content
- determining the method of reproduction
- marking of material for reproduction, if necessary
- preparing a reply or order form

The fee covers up to 30 minutes of staff research and three xerographic copies if information is found. If more than three copies are made, or if copies from microfilm are required, a bill for the additional copies will be included with the response. If the search is negative, the search process will conclude with a reply delineating those materials examined. If extended, in-depth research is required, a list of professional researchers familiar with the printed and manuscript material in the collections will be furnished.

All visitors are welcome to use, free of charge, the printed and manuscript resources of the Virginia State Library and Archives during the hours of 8:15 to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday, except on legal holidays. An experienced professional staff is available to answer questions and to provide assistance in using our resources. Correspondents are also encouraged to consult their local library or historical society for information and assistance.

* **ON THE OREGON TRAIL**

"Wagons, ho!" To make a pioneer trip out west without leaving your living room, there's "Oregon Trail," a computer game that simulates an 1848 family's journey westward. Available at most software stores, the game is fun for the whole family. With information on landmarks, forts, and rivers along the trail, it teaches problem solving, geography, and reading comprehension as well as the history of this part of America. * **SCOTLAND ARCHIVE**

The Borders Region Archive and Local History Centre was established in 1984. It is housed in the Regional Library Headquarters at Selkirk, Scotland. The Borders Archive attempts to make all local history records available in one facility. They have a large collection of published local history materials, as well as original documents of historical significance. Its main holding is the pre-1975 County Council records for Berwickshire, Peeblesshire, Roxburghshire and Selkirkshire. They have a microfiche index to christenings and marriages in the pre-1855 Old Parish Records for each county in Scotland. * **NEW CZECH SURNAME INDEX**

The Czechoslovak Genealogical Society International, P.O. Box 16225, St. Paul, MN 55116, has recently published Czecho-Slovak Surname Index, Col 3, which has over 1700 entries giving place of family origin in Czechoslovakia, and U.S. or Canadian location. DID YOU KNOW?

- * Did you know that spouses of aliens had to take an oath of allegiance to the United States and in so doing supplied information about their birth, marriage, and personal appearance, which can be found at your county court house? (Heritage Searchers of Kandiyohi County)
- * Have you come across the term "processioning" in your research? The Lake Elsinore G.S. of Lake Elsinore, CA, gives a definition of this term. Processioning was a procedure organized and governed by the Church Vestry in which men were appointed to walk specified boundary lines of the neighbors' property. Boundaries in the 17th and 18th centuries were marked with perishable items such as a tree, a stake, a pile of rocks, etc., which necessitated frequent remarking. Processioning was done once a year in an attempt to settle any boundary disputes between neighbors before the disputes became serious and were taken to court. It was often the occasion for a neighborhood party when the neighbors gathered, remarked their lines as necessary and spent the rest of the day and evening visiting, eating, and drinking! - **Collecting** EGS books from Lake Hills Library and the books and materials from storage in Renton Self-Storage Locker.
- **Sorting and evaluating** the books and materials for inclusion in the new collection.
- **Preparing and binding** the periodicals we have been collecting and storing in various places including a great number that Pat Thomas has been so caringly cataloging and storing for EGS.
- **Begging and cajoling** our membership and friends to donate wonderful books to add to our new collection. Donations of books or money will be gratefully accepted at any time and we will arrange to pick up the books at your home if at all possible. Books may also be brought to the General Meetings or Board Meetings.
- **Assembling, cataloging, and boxing** the books to be sent to the Administration office for processing.
- **Assisting** the Bellevue Library in moving the existing books to a new area to make room for the Genealogy Collection and then putting the collection in place when it is ready.

The King County probate case indexes are a guide to the probate files of King County courts. Although most of the cases in this Index are estates (probate), there are also guardianship, partnership, partnership estate, trusteeship, and miscellaneous cases. This surname Index (containing 17,000 names) provides the case number for individuals which then can be used to obtain copies of the records from King County.

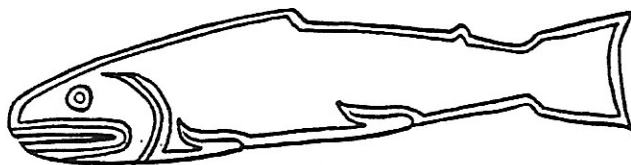

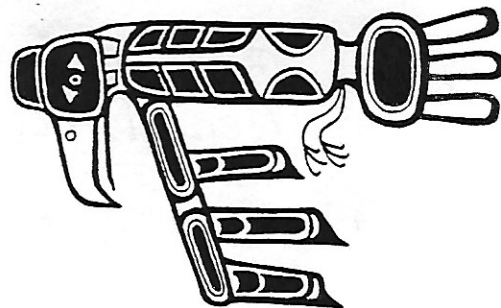
